ISSUES IN HEALTHCARE PLANNING ON THE COAST

- COORDINATION OF PROVIDERS AND PROVIDER GROUPS—cooperation among providers and provider groups (eg, Sutter, Kaiser, Stanford) to provide coordinated care on the coast.
- INSURANCE COVERAGE—multiple payers and multiple payment models

 Well over half of residents have either Kaiser, Medicare or Health Plan of San Mateo

 Need to ensure that services are available regardless of insurance plan
- TECHNOLOGY—communication regarding a patient's care needs to be shareable across provider groups. For example, lab results need to be available to physicians regardless of where the lab work was done.
- ACCEPTANCE BY THE COMMUNITY—Services should be in a predictable environment that inspires confidence and trust and they should be used often enough to make the providers want to continue their investment
